Dear Friends in Christ,

Recently, I was having a conversation with a member of our congregation. The topic of church attendance—or lack thereof—of our members arose. One of the things that was brought up by this member is that sometimes things have to happen to get people in the door. Reference was made to the 9/11 attack, with the comment that, granted it was 20 years ago, but if an attack on our homeland isn't enough to get people back to church, one wonders what it will take.

Those who were around 20 years ago when that attack took place will remember that the churches—including St. Paul, I am guessing, since I was not here at that time—were full...for about two or three weeks. Then, the threat of attack seemed to subside and people returned to normal patterns. Church attendance resumed its normal patterns.

By no means do we want to see a repeat of a mass casualty event or for our nation to engage in warfare. And certainly, we pray no tragedy or hardship strikes the homes and families of our congregation. However, sometimes we are simply too comfortable. We find ourselves content and so the desire or impulse to attend the services of God's house and to be involved in the life of the congregation wanes. It doesn't seem as crucial because God is meeting all our needs and we feel as if we dwell in safety. But do you?

The apostle Peter reminds us, “Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour” (1 Peter 5:8b, ESV). Satan never rests from his work of deceiving Jesus' people. And one of his tactics could very easily be a lull people into a false sense of security—making them feel safe and secure when they really should be alert to what is happening to them. The roaring takes on the tone of a comforting purr. If you read the book of Revelation, chapter three talks about the church in Laodicea which is coming into judgment because they are lukewarm, neither hot nor cold. As a result, they are told that the Lord will soon spit them out. The same thing happened with the Old Testament nation of Israel. They would become comfortable and forget about their need for the Lord, and actually end up wandering off at times after other gods, and bring judgment upon themselves.

This satanic tempting with comfort is similar to the account of how you boil a frog alive (not that I have ever tried this to see if it is true). Frogs are cold-blooded, so their body temperature adjusts to its surroundings. If you put a frog in a pan of cool water, it will swim around and do its frog thing. Supposedly, if you little by little increase the heat under that pan, the frog's body temperature will adjust to its surroundings. It grows comfortable in the increasing temperature of the water. As the water gets warmer, so does the frog's body temperature, until the heat gets to be too much for the frog and it dies because of the heat of the water surrounding it as the water boils. The frog, from my understanding, never resists or struggles because it is lulled into this false sense of comfort, not recognizing the danger that surrounds it.

When we become complacent about or disinterested in the things of God, we have fallen victim to the ploys of the roaring lion. Fortunately, there *is* a remedy. The house of God is always open for you, the invitation always extended for you to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament for reviving that which has grown dormant or complacent within you. The answer to the temptation of Satan to put aside the things of God is the life that Jesus alone gives, life that is full and vibrant, active and thriving. Receive His gifts and have life in abundance!

Stewardship Thoughts – from LCMS Stewardship Ministry

When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1-4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures; who gave her everything she had; who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves, children of the slave woman, under the Old Covenant (Galatians 4). We are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs. And heirs receive the inheritance. For everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands.

So, what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide.

We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Corinthians 16:1-2, 2 Corinthians 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7)!

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, and without resources for the poor and needy.

In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34-40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the rest fall through your fingers to your neighbors – your family, your friends, your community, your church.

The Indentured Heart by Gilbert Morris

The Sequel to the American Historical Novels, The Honorable Imposter and The Captive Bride. The Indentured Heart opens another chapter in the compelling saga of the Winslow family. Pre-Revolutionary America was stirring the flames for freedom and the Great Awakening under Jonathan Edwards was renewing a nation's spiritual values. Adam Winslow, a man of the soil, has different interests and skills than his father and grandfather. But their patriotism and spiritual fervor have left their imprint on his personality. And far off in England a young beggar girl is about to be given the chance of a lifetime. Molly Burns has lived under the constant terror of her drunken, abusive father, but rescue comes to her doorstep in the person of Adam Winslow. He promises to bring her safely to America on the condition that she become an indentured servant for ten years. Escape from her wretched circumstances and the distant glimmer of freedom in a new land help to make her decision. But this young servant girl had no way to knowing that she would be bound by more than indentureship to the Winslows. What was the true meaning of freedom to a young girl, to a family, to a nation?

The Saintly Buccaneer by Gilbert Morris

The Saintly Buccaneer spotlights Paul Winslow, a young man who is bitterly opposed to the American Revolution. His life is quickly changed when he is shanghaied and pressed into service aboard a navy frigate. And then he is struck with amnesia! House of Winslow book.

The Silent Harp by Gilbert Morris

Sharon Winslow is artistic, wealthy, socially prominent--and determined to remain single. Having lost her first love in the Great War, she is certain that marriage is not for her. Then she meets Temple Smith, a rough man who appears as uncouth as he is poor. What could a woman of her stature and talent find in such a man? Her hopeless attraction to him vies with her fear that he is only after her money. But where differences abound, the adventure of love begins.
